



INTRODUCTION OF A SPECIAL FAMILY



Grand Exalted Ruler, Brother Leach introduced to the delegates a young family who in the last two years have struggled. Angela Dickson, seventeen years old was introduced along with her siblings, twenty one year old sister Meghan and fourteen year old brother Nathan, both of whom have complex needs.

Two years ago when their father walked out on them they lost everything including the house they lived in. As a single Mom, it wasn't easy trying to find a decent place to live and to make ends meet. To help, Angela found work and helped as much as she could caring for her two siblings. Angela graduated from Leo Hayes High School this year, and things were finally looking brighter until their mother got sick and was rushed to the hospital for emergency surgery. While on the operating table she suffered a heart attack.

With their mother still in the hospital, Fredericton Elks Lodge No. 274 helped out with food and donations for the family and when Social Services stepped in, Angela was told that in order for them to remain on Social Assistance she had to quit her jobs. Today, the delegates were asked to open their hearts and give to help this family and in just over fifteen minutes \$2,000.00 was raised and presented to Angela who was very grateful. With the funds collected the Elks have made a difference for this amazing family who at the beginning refused

to ask for help.









MARKETING COMMITTEE PRESENTATION

Brother Kevin Tutthill was called upon to let everyone know what the Marketing Committee had

been working on this year. A survey had been sent to all members of the National Executive, Provincial Presidents and all the chairpersons of the National Committees. The test was to get feedback on the idea of creating a national mascot. The plan for next year is to have a naming contest and create resources to use the mascot at the Lodge level. The Marketing Committee hopes that Provincial Associations, Districts and Lodges get on board with the idea, and have the mascot all over the country.



After the unveiling of the mascot, the delegates were divided into groups and were asked to put together some ideas on how the mascot could help in their communities. In summarizing, Brother Tutthill went on to say that



a mascot just might be one of the best investments you can make for your Lodge and your Lodge's image. It may seem like a big upfront investment, but this is more than just a monetary investment. This could be the future of your Lodge, District or Association. Using your mascot for promotional purposes will cost exponentially less than any other form of advertising. Grand Exalted Ruler Brother Leach called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. and introduced Brother Leonard Shain, Chair of the National Charities Committee to take charge of the meeting.

Brother Shain thanked everyone for being in attendance and proceeded to acknowledge the National Charities Committee members present as well as thanking the Grand Lodge staff for their help in the past year.

GUEST PRESENTATION



Jennifer O'Donnell, representing Speech-Language & Audiology Canada, addressed the delegates. Jennifer is current working as a speech-language pathologist primarily with preschoolers, at the Chaleur Regional Hospital in Bathurst, New Brunswick. She extended warm greetings and thanked the Elks for their continued support of SAC and, in particular, support for the professions of audiology and speech-language pathology. Jennifer highlighted the fact that the Elks of Canada were the recipients of the Speech-Language & Audiology

Canada 2016 Consumer Advocacy Award. She showed the delegates the video SAC prepared to introduce



the Elks of Canada as the worthy recipients of this prestigious award. (You can view the video on our Facebook page.) Along with congratulatory remarks, the award was presented again in front of the delegates emphasizing the fact that the award truly belongs to the members and supporters who advocated for Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Programs across Canada.

Dominic Leach, Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks of Canada accepted the award on behalf of the Elks who have made an outstanding impact on the

professions by actively and significantly advocating on behalf of individuals with communication disorders locally, regionally and nationally.

GUEST SPEAKER

Bonnie Kilburn introduced some members of the Davidson family to the delegates in attendance. Tim Davidson, and his two young daughters, Alice and Samantha, and his brother, Gregory, have all been involved with the APSEA/ELKS Deaf Camp at Magaguadavic Lake in New Brunswick. This camp is owned by the Fredericton Capital Y's Men and is donated to the Provincial Elks Association for a week each summer. Through a partnership with Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority, the provincial Elks Association conduct the camp to bring together and allow the deaf and hard-of-hearing young individuals in the Maritimes to experience camp activities in a safe, active and fun environment while connecting with others who share and understand the experience of living with hearing loss.



In speaking to the delegates, Tim described some of the highlights of his personal camp experiences much to the delight of those in attendance. He thanked the Lodges in New Brunswick for their financial support of the camp, as well as the delegates whose support is received through a yearly contribution through our national charity. Brother Leonard Shain, National



Charities Committee Chairman, thanked Tim for making the effort to attend the meeting and for sharing his heart-warming stories about the positive impact the camp provided for him as a camper and volunteer.

CONVENTION GRANT RECIPIENT

The Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children provides a grant of up to \$2,500.00 available to the host national convention organizers for a purpose that is consistent with the Fund's purpose. This year's grant recipient as chosen by the Host Lodge was Mr. Leo Johnson, Chair of the Chalmers Hospital Foundation in Fredericton.

Mr. Johnson explained the Chalmers Care for Kids program. The Pediatric Unit at the Dr. Everett Chalmers Regional Hospital provides care to children from infancy up to 17 years of age with a wide variety of health conditions.

They have launched a campaign to help raise funds which will be used to improve outpatient clinic space for not only the specialists that travel to Fredericton, but for the youth that seek outpatient services like chemotherapy or blood work. Inpatient rooms will also be refurbished to reflect a more

family friendly space for parents and children whether it's for a short term or long term stay.

There is currently no designated area for children of any age admitted to the pediatric unit with mental health issues. Mr. Johnson being familiar with mental illness in young adolescents says the funds received today will help in creating a brand new treatment space specifically designed for youth with mental health conditions.





Grand Exalted Ruler, Dominic Leach, presented a "big" cheque to Brother Leonard Shain, National Charities Committee Chairman, representing the \$490,670.03 donated to the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children over the past year from the Elk members/supporters, Lodges, and Provincial Associations.

SPECIAL CONTRIBUTION AWARDS

Each year the National Charities Committee recognizes Lodges for outstanding contributions to the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children. Lodges that contribute over \$100/member and over \$10,000.00 in the past year are acknowledged and thanked.

In 2015-16, 37 Elks Lodges donated over \$100/member, and 4 Elks Lodges donated in excess of \$10,000.00. Certificates are prepared for all Lodges attaining this status and the Lodges with the highest totals are awarded at the meeting. For the year 2015-16, this honour was awarded to Burnaby Elks Lodge No. 497 (\$1,609.24/member). Brother Vaino Pennanen, BC Provincial President, accepted the certificate on behalf of Burnaby Elks Lodge and will deliver it to the Lodge.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The 2016-2017 Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children Financial Statements were presented. It was noted that investment losses and decreased revenues resulted in a shorfall in the year end totals. The National Charities Committee is optimistic that strategies proposed and inclusion in the Elks Strategic Plan will enable the charity to reduce funding overlaps and explore a wider range of support and focus, market the charity more effectively and transition to a greater return on investment and achievement.

The National Charity also recognized and thanked Louise Higginbottom, a member of Trenville Royal Purple Elks Lodge No. 248, who collected donations encouraging her to shave her head. Saying she "did it for the kids", she was able to collect \$1,500.00 for the Fund for Children.

There will be a decrease to the funding for the programs but an increase for personal assistance. The Clinical Programs would still be able to provide the same amount of service, only in a different manner. It would work along the same line as the personal assistance program.

Brother Shain mentioned that the Butterfly Collection netted a total of \$852.15.

There being no further business, Brother Shain turned the meeting over to Grand Exalted Ruler Leach, who thanked everyone for their support. The annual general meeting of the Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children was adjourned at 10:15 a.m.

GRAND EXALTED RULER'S ACCEPTANCE SPEECH

It is a great honor and privilege to be here this evening as your Grand Exalted Ruler. There are many people out here this evening who have supported my journey through this Order and I will be forever grateful. Thank you so much for this support. Before I begin to address you, the delegates this evening there are a few items which we as delegates need to give many thanks to. Could we please ask the Host Committee volunteers to stand and be recognized for the tremendous job in hosting this Convention. Please, if we could all stand and give the chef and his crews a great hand for the wonderful supper this evening. I would also like to take this time to thank the members of Alberta Districts 1 & 3 for their support and understanding during the last few months and special recognition to them for their support of the hospitality room this week. You have all been terrific.

At this time, I would like to ask all the members of the Grand Executive to stand and be recognized. I would also like to have all members of our National Committees who are in attendance to stand and be recognized.

I woke up some time ago to this wonderful music coming through my bedroom window. I jumped from my bed and ran to my window to see where it was all coming from. Outside my window in our maple tree was this beautiful songbird singing its heart out while her mate was building a nest in the tree to start a future generation of songbirds. I could not but notice that this songbird was not over with the mallard duck asking it to join her culture or give his beautiful purple, green and black feathers in exchange for hers; she was not over to mother goose asking her to join her culture or give her long neck and webbed feet. Nor was she over at the Elks pen asking the elks to join her culture or exchange their antlers and four feet for hers. She was just doing what songbirds have done for generations. Singing and eating those nasty bugs that bother me all the time. The Elks too are part of a culture, in fact a very large culture of organizations which help strengthened their communities and provide for others in society who have fallen to some unfortunate circumstances. As a culture we are subject to many extreme internal and external challenges. Dr. Izzo who spoke to the delegates at the Convention in Chilliwack suggested that it would take all members and delegates to provide the leadership and initiative if we are going to survive for another hundred years. We continue as an organization to plan our future and produce effective ideas to address the internal culture which involves addressing the needs of our current members and Lodges so they continue to support the organization through volunteer efforts. The National Planning Committee along with our Membership and Marketing Committees continue to address the need for our organization to effectively attract members in our society to become the backbone of our Order by addressing the external pressure facing our Order. We as an organization have been riding the Winds of Change for more than twenty years hoping that we would attract the attention of members of society to join and contribute to our great Order. Unfortunately, the results have been less than we have anticipated resulting in disappointing increases to our membership.

I remember as a child growing up in school of our desire to change the world and make it a better place to live as my parents struggled to make a living with eight children and farming being what it was. I think we indeed have changed the world, maybe not always for the best. Many years ago as a member of our National Charities Committee we were fortunate to be hosted by the BC Family Hearing Resource Centre in Langley BC. While we were there, a young child just one month old was receiving treatment for its hearing loss. I wonder today how that child is coping with its hearing loss and how that child will be contributing to society rather than taking from society. Our National Charity, the Elks & Royal Purple for Children continues to provide support to provincial initiatives. The Fund has experienced a significant drop in donations resulting in our inability to provide funding to our provincial programs at our previous extended amounts. I would encourage all Lodges who have any additional funds to donate them to our National Charity. With approx. 32 million plus people in Canada that a simple donation of 10 cents per individual would net the fund some 3.5 million dollars. Now I know this might be impossible but even one quarter of individuals donating would still bring in significant funds for our charity. It is said that in the US, hearing loss costs the American people over 180 million dollars in losses and this figure does not take in to account tax revenue streams. I encourage you as members to

bring all ideas forward for discussion. Remember, a fire starts with a spark, spreads to a flame, and grows into a blaze then a fire out of control to an inferno. What a difference just a couple of great ideas could make should they grow into an inferno. A great saying, that goes like this: **Dead fish go with the flow, you the members and the leaders of this order cannot afford to be dead fish if this organization wants to survive for the next hundred years.**

As I have stated before, our Order has made significant change but the issues are much more embedded in society itself directed by the aspirations and motivations brought on by the current cycle of society. We will need to continue to work hard to overcome the motivations of todays' society. Brothers, Sisters and Ladies, if you are staying in the area for a few weeks I pray you have a great time and enjoy this eastern hospitality. Or if you are like myself going home within a few days, I wish you a safe return. I look forward to meeting and talking with many of you during my travels this year.

The Grand Executive is pleased to present to the membership the following report of the Grand Executive, outlining some of the important events and activities from the past year, but also looking ahead into the future and what goals and plans the Grand Executive have established for the Order for the 2016-17 year.

LOOKING BACK

In the last few years we have witnessed some of the most dramatic changes in our Order since it began. The Royal Purple of Canada formed their own society, establishing themselves as a separate and distinct group from the Elks of Canada. With this move a number of Royal Purple Lodges decided to stay within the Order and received Charters as Royal Purple Elks Lodges. As well a number of Royal Purple members made the decision to join an existing Elks Lodge. We hope you have felt welcome over the past year. We value the history, experience and contribution you bring to the Order. Thank you for making the decision to stay a part of the Elks of Canada.

With this major change behind us we can now look to the future as one Order. With a more streamlined governing structure we can now adapt quicker and bring about changes for our future. We recognize that the changes over the last couple of years have not been easy but your Executive now considers that as part of our history and we are now focusing on our future.

OUR NATIONAL COMMITTEES REFLECT THE STRENGTH OF OUR ORDER

There has been much work done this year at the national level, and much of it could not have been completed without the assistance of our dedicated members who volunteered to be a part of our national committees. The work that is being done by these fine brothers and sisters in the areas of marketing, member services, finance, charity, judiciary and sports can at times go on without fanfare, but certainly is not unnoticed by the Grand Executive. We thank all who have participated on these committees over the last year and are appreciative of the time spent on conference calls and face to face meetings helping move the Elks of Canada forward.

A NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BRINGS FRESH PERSPECTIVES FOR THE FUTURE

Brother Bill Blake, a long-standing source of stability for the Grand Lodge, stepped down from his Executive Administrator role in the fall of 2015, leaving the administrative body of the organization without a leader for the first time in over 30 years.

Bill's retirement presented an opportunity for the Elks of Canada - a chance to seek out a new Executive Director with a fresh perspective and a skill set capable to help the Order look at modernizing the way in which we operate; a chance to look at our organization from a different angle, and identify opportunities that perhaps those of us who have been staring at the same issues may have become blind to over time.

A national executive recruitment firm was contracted to source out a list of qualified candidates for the position, and after a thorough review and lengthy selection process, Kevan McBeth was selected as our new Executive Director of the Elks of Canada in November. Kevan brings with him over 15 years of executive level leadership in the Human Resources field, but more importantly he brings a strong vision for the future of the Elks and the development of a culture capable of attracting and retaining the next generation of Elks members, so that we may continue to write the story of the impacts of the Elks in communities across Canada. He has taken a collaborative approach to his new role and believes that it is through the work of us all that we can continue to grow and develop the impact of the Elks across Canada.

STRUCTURING LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND PLANNING STRATEGICALLY

With a new model in place for this year, the Grand Executive has also taken a new approach to bringing our Forward Planning Committee together to develop a strategic plan. The current practice has been to bring together Provincial Presidents and Vice-Presidents, Committee Chairs and the Executive members for a strategic planning session in October. Although this collaborative approach has been successful in the development of a plan, the cost of bringing the members of the Committee together coupled with the fact the session takes place half way through the year of the installed leadership created additional challenges and late implementation of the plan itself.

This year, we have chosen to hold the strategic planning session prior to the National Convention, creating an opportunity for the strategic plan to be implemented on a timing cycle with the newly installed leadership, while dramatically reducing the costs associated with bringing the committee together.

A similar approach will be taken next year with leadership development. The Inspiring Community Leaders session that has been traditionally operated in November each year with members of the Order who have been identified as having leadership capabilities within their Lodges will be postponed this year so there will be an opportunity for the leadership session to take place prior to next year's National Convention.

This change will allow for our new leaders to potentially experience some or all of the National Convention while they are present for the leadership course, which we feel provides them with greater exposure to the activities that go on during these proceedings.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF A CULTURE CHANGE PLAN

Tasked with the direction to create a culture change management plan, the Executive Director of the Elks of Canada created a culture change plan that will assist the Elks of Canada in evolving the overall culture of the organization to ensure we are building a modern and welcoming organization capable of attracting, retaining and developing the next generation of Elks.

The recommended change model reflects the need to both seek out new and innovative ways to modernize the Order, while also understanding and respecting the significance of the 100+ years of foundation that has been laid by Elks members before us. We need to continue to accomplish change through an approach that both reflects the legacy of the past, but allows us to build the future through innovative practices that will position us as the benevolent Order of choice for the next generation of membership.

Our model also reflects a need to focus on both formal actions, such as policies and education of our members, and informal actions, such as communication and member engagement activities, to push the organization forward and ensure our change in culture is one that is embedded in our organizational values and celebrated across the Order.

The strategy recommends we break the change plan into 4 key quadrants of change: Clarifying Expectations, Instilling Capacity for Change, Building Momentum for Change and Fostering Commitment. Our goal moving forward is to achieve gains in each of these quadrants for the foreseeable future in order to ensure our change is entrenched in our culture.

THE ELKS AND ROYAL PURPLE FUND FOR CHILDREN CELEBRATES AN AWARD WINNING YEAR

Since 1956, Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children has been recognized locally, nationally and internationally for the work that has been done to support children with hearing disabilities and the need for intervention in the areas of speech and hearing for children as early as at birth.

Through your work and lending your voice to the support of this vulnerable sector of our society, the Elks have lobbied provincial governments and demanded higher levels of support for children to ensure their needs are met as soon as possible, with the understanding that early intervention can result in addressing issues and ensuring children can be successfully included in their communities.

In the fall of 2015, the Charities Committee submitted a nomination application on behalf of the Elks of Canada to Speech-Language and Audiology Canada (SAC), and were thrilled to learn the Elks had been awarded the 2016 Consumer Advocacy Award for all of the work the Order does, and continues to do, to promote Early Hearing Detection Intervention on behalf of newborn children with hearing disabilities.

At the SAC National Convention in the spring in Halifax, your Grand Exalted Ruler Dominic Leach, accepted the award on behalf of the Elks of Canada, and another presentation of the award will also be performed at the Charities Committee meeting during this convention.

YOUR NATIONAL CHARITY IS IN NEED OF YOUR SUPPORT

As proud as we all are of the impacts of the Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children, the past year has been a difficult one for the charity from a financial perspective. The Fund for Children relies exclusively on the funds that are generated from the local lodges, provincial associations and individual donations of the Elks to fund provincial programs within the provinces as well as support individual pleas for support for children in need. Last year, the Fund for Children operated with a financial deficit of nearly \$250,000, directly impacting the long term investments and contingencies of the charity significantly. With lower levels of funding coming through the National Charity, the Charities Committee had to make some difficult, yet necessary, decisions to cut funding to local programming and still continue to draw down from our reserves to meet the level of support that our communities have come to expect from the Elks of Canada.

A more aggressive fund development approach will be explored through the Grand Lodge Office to improve donor access and donor reach, but the life blood of the charity continues to be the donations that we receive from you, the members. We strongly encourage you to continue to give to your National Charity, and give generously.

THE THEME OF THE CONFERENCE - THE THREE R'S

The theme of this year's conference focuses on what the committee is referring to as the three R's: Relevance. Respect. (Making it) Real.

These are key areas of focus for the Elks of Canada moving into the next year, and it is the belief of the Grand Executive there is opportunity within each of the three areas for our Order to continue to push ourselves so we may continue to strive towards our stated vision to become the best volunteer organization in Canadian communities.

We need to continue to remain relevant to the communities we serve, as well as the members who fill our lodges. Understanding what we can do for our communities is important, however, learning WHY we do what we do builds relevance. We often talk about being visible in the community as being a way of establishing relevance, and that is true- but communicating why we are there, and what is in the hearts of each and every member is what will help give us purpose, and ultimately build a deeper connection with the communities we serve.

Respect for our fellow members and our increasingly diverse communities is another key opportunity for the Elks of Canada in 2016-17. With a need to grow and build our membership for the next generation of membership, we also need to reflect on the openness and inclusive behaviours that are necessary for us all to follow to ensure we are attracting new members from a variety of backgrounds and cultural beliefs. We need to hold each other accountable, and reinforce the inclusive behaviours that support our virtues of equality, love, kindness and respect.

(Making it) Real requires taking our intentions and turning them into action. As the saying goes "Without action, the best of intentions in the world are nothing more than that: intentions." We as an Order need to move beyond the discussion or the intent, and translate those positive thoughts into action to serve the people in our communities and be the change that we wish to see in the world. It is our realization of our intentions that convert the kindness of our intentions into the magic that you see in our action.

WE ARE

Today's Elks are a group of individual brothers and sisters who come from diverse walks of life, but are joined by our desire to belong to something larger than ourselves. It is that diversity of who each of us are that will continue to strengthen and broaden the reach of the Elks as a relevant organization to communities across the country.

Over the next year, we hope to celebrate who we are as Elks, but also as individuals who contribute to the greater good. We are mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers. We are accountants and truck drivers. We are teachers and students. The one thing that binds us together is Elkdom – our desire to be a part of a fraternal organization; an opportunity to make a difference.

You will see "We Are" shirts for sale in the store here in Fredericton, and we expect to run a number of campaigns and contests over the course of the next year to highlight individual "We Are" stories to bring to light the diversity of the Order and celebrate our common focus.

A LOOK AHEAD TO 2016-17

2016-17 is going to be a challenging year for the Order, but one we hope is rewarding. We continue to build a collaborative approach to planning through the Forward Planning Committee, which consists of representation of every province through their Provincial Presidents and First Vice Presidents, and maintain open channels of communications for discussion and debate. The road ahead is one that is not necessarily an easy one, but if we are able to tackle it together, we have an opportunity to position ourselves as the benevolent society of choice

for those wishing to belong to an organization such as ours. We have a window of opportunity to move the Order forward in a modern direction, but that change needs to be achieved through the work of us all, not just a few key individuals.

The Grand Lodge will be busy this year putting in place the necessary foundation required to continue to move the organization forward for the future, but it is up to us all to leverage it.



REPORT OF THE GRAND EXALTED RULER TO THE 2016 GRAND LODGE CONVENTION

The Elks National Convention is just around the corner as I am writing this report, yet it is most assuredly happening as I read this report. As far as I can tell, it is almost a poor man's version of time travel. As some of you, or maybe all of you know, the eloquent line from our 11 O'Clock Service, '....such as the circumstances of life may call upon us...' rang very true within my life a few years ago and it caused me not be available to travel this past year. It was not an easy decision to continue the journey through the chairs in the Grand Executive. I felt somewhat like I was letting the membership down. I would not be able to provide them the opportunity to have their national leader come and see what they are doing. You see, being the Grand Exalted Ruler or the National President of the Elks of Canada is not an honor, it is a duty. The main reason you are there, is by the grace of your membership. You owe them your time and your commitment. For this reason, I was disappointed in my situation. The other members of the Grand Executive tried to make adjustments to see if we could switch, but that also became impossible. After speaking with many of you, the members, from across the country over the last few years, you showed empathy and support for my predicament. I was urged to continue on and that there were many in the wings willing to help. My fellow Grand Executive members were especially supportive and helped carry the weight and duties that are assigned to the Grand Exalted Ruler. For this I thank you all.

My year as your national leader has been an honor. Your projects and endeavors across this country have been nothing short of miraculous. Whether it be providing a chest compression system to the Helicopter Emergency Response Team in Kamloops BC, a Caroline's cart in Red Deer Alberta, an FM system for a school in Corner Brook, Newfoundland, or any one of the thousands of acts and donations our Lodges have been involved with this year, I have been able to share these with you. In British Columbia, at their provincial conference, I was fortunate enough to be witness to an act of kindness that brought some to tears. In Saskatchewan, I heard a woman speak of her organization's children who were helped by the Elks with a passion and sense of selfishness that took the words out of the mouths of members who bore witness to these acts and were overwhelmed by their impact and relevance to those children's lives. To be present and allowed to participate, in these intimate moments, has been an absolute privilege and honor.

The importance of what we do is overshadowed at most times with our sense of humility and grace which hinders our willingness to celebrate our benevolence to our friends and neighbors. We almost feel like we are showing off. Well...we need to start showing off a great deal more. Kids are better served when we are showing off our projects and activities. A good example of this was when the Ontario Elks Association held their walkathon during their conference. They rented a bus and brought everyone down to the waterfront where three dozen of us were piped around the waterfront for a few kilometers. The people at the market there and around the area, were extremely complimentary and brought smiles and cheers. The walkathon certainly raised money, but even more valuable was the exhibition of the event that the Elks in North Bay and Ontario are moving forward and remaining relevant to their communities.

As an Executive, we were challenged at times by situations which demanded a move away from our areas of comfort. As you will hear during our financial reports, this year was difficult due to a 'Perfect Storm' of conditions

that caused us some sleepless nights. As well we were presented with situations demanding patience and temperance in order to make difficult decisions. I commend all of the Grand Executive for their ability to look at situations and deliberate for the purpose of finding a solution that incorporated the values of equality and justice.

I also commend the Provincial Presidents, their 1st Vices and the National Committee Chairpeople, our Forward Planning Committee, for their efforts in continuing to develop our strategic plan. Their conclusions that this organization needs to focus on the human element and the inclusion of all members of society and their needs. Making our organization become more flexible, accommodating, and welcoming is coming along. Another major focus this past year, as outlined by the members of the Forward Planning Committee, has been on communication methods. For several years we have professed the advantages of using electronic mail and social media. This past year we have asked the Presidents and their Executives to really focus on collecting email addresses. The effectiveness in terms of time is only outweighed by the savings incurred by using this medium over standardized post. There is obviously still a need in some cases to maintain a hard copy mail out, but there is consensus that the sooner we move toward a greater use of electronic communication, the more advantageous it will be to our organization's communications.

On an administrative side, we spent the last 6 months with our new Executive Director. Kevan McBeth has certainly proven to this Grand Executive that he was willing to learn and take a leadership role in this organization. He has developed many tools and instituted processes that have addressed areas that were lacking. He has and is spending long hours analyzing our organization from the inside out while constantly being vigilant in his communications with its members. Kevan's first 6 months have been nothing short of exemplary and as a national executive body, we as the Grand Executive appreciate what he has brought to the table up to this point and anxiously look forward to future initiatives.

GRAND EXECUTIVE REPORT ON CONSTITUTION, BYLAWS, & REGULATIONS

Changes to Regulations recommended by any Unit of the Order which are deemed by the Grand Executive to be necessary or in the best interest of the Order can be made by the Grand Executive. The Grand Executive does not have the authority to change the Bylaws as they can only be changed by the delegates voting on resolutions at Grand Lodge Convention.

The following areas of the Regulations (other than numbering) were amended by the Grand Executive since the last Convention:

Lodge Regulation Section 6.2.3 to read "The registration fee shall be paid for all Past Grand Exalted Rulers and Past Supreme Honoured Royal Ladies who have joined the Elks, in attendance at Grand Lodge Convention.

It was suggested that if the existing Royal Purple Elk members who had attained Life membership status prior to August, 1992 are to be treated as equals to the Elks Automatic Life members that their fees be waived. The following regulations effective January 1, 2016: **Grand Lodge Regulations, Section 4 – Dues and Fees** (Page 36), 1.1; Lodge Regulation, Section 7 - Membership (page 62) 5.1; Lodge Regulations, Section 8 – Dues and Fees (Page 66), 1 will therefore reflect those changes.

REPORT TO THE GRAND EXECUTIVE TO THE 2016 GRAND LODGE CONVENTION UNDER ARTICLE 2, SECTION 5.3.1 (PG 24) OF THE OF THE CONSTITUTION, BYLAWS, & REGULATIONS OF THE ELKS OF CANADA

The Elks of Canada Memorial Building Fund was established by resolution at the 1992 Grand Lodge Convention. Article 2, Section 5.3.1 (pg. 24) reads as follows:

Memorial Building Fund:

Any cash contribution to the Grand Lodge, made in any manner whatsoever, may be designated by the contributor to the Memorial Building Fund. All such contributions shall be credited to the Memorial Building Fund and contributions to the Fund of \$100.00 or more shall be acknowledged and recognized in an appropriate manner within the confines of the Elks Building.

The Memorial Building Fund shall be used to enhance the uses, purposes and beautification of our national home and shall be administered by the Grand Executive who shall report annually to the Grand Lodge Convention on the status of the Fund.

REPORT OF THE AUDIT/FINANCE COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 2016

Worthy Grand Exalted Ruler, Members of the Grand Executive, Brothers and Sisters, Elks of Canada.

The Financial Statements of the Grand Lodge of the Elks of Canada, which includes the General Fund and the Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children, have been audited in accordance with the Constitution on a consolidated basis by our auditors Deloitte LLP. These Financial Statements, together with the accompanying Auditors Report have been reviewed and approved by the Audit/Finance Committee and the Grand Executive.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for not-for-profit organizations except that no provision has been made for amortization on the cost of the Grand Lodge office building and on subsequent additions. The financial statements are the responsibility of Management who is responsible for their preparation and fair presentation, and for such internal controls as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Financial information presented in this report is consistent with information in the financial statements.

The Grand Executive, Grand Lodge Committees and Grand Lodge Office staff are to be commended for their efforts to work within their budgets during the year and for their co-operation, communication and understanding throughout the budgeting process. During the past year Grand Lodge incurred some expenses that were not anticipated. As well, investments did not do as well as forecasted. The Finance Committee and the Grand Executive had several discussions during the year on how to keep expenses down and in the end our loss was actually less than the amount budgeted. The net loss from operations for the year was \$68,446 compared to a budgeted loss of \$99,361. The overall net assets of Grand Lodge decreased to \$1,406,528.

The Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children showed a net loss of \$240,774 decreasing its overall net assets to \$1,305,098.

BUDGET

Membership Fees

We experienced a small decline in membership paying members during the past year. At present we have 10,559 members including 450 family members. For 2016-17 we are budgeting for a fee income of \$545,530 compared to actual fees of \$544,346 in fiscal 2015-16. This includes an increase of \$.07 per member based on an increase in the consumer price index as provided for in the bylaws. This change will not take place until January 1, 2017.

Investment Income

Investment income declined to \$5,135 in fiscal 2015-16 compared to \$35,426 for fiscal 2014-15. In discussion with our investment advisor that markets may show moderate gains during the coming year we have budgeted for investment income of \$15,000 for fiscal 2016-17.

Facilities Net Income

Net income from Grand Lodge office building increased to \$68,731 in fiscal 2015-16 compared to \$38,683 in fiscal 2014-15 due to an increase in rental income and a decrease in the cost of improvements. For fiscal 2016-17 we are budgeting for a net facilities income of \$81,015 which includes a reduction in expected repairs and maintenance of \$18,000.

Operating Expenses

We are budgeting for total operating expenses of \$385,150 for fiscal 2016-17. This includes a one-time expense of \$7,000 for a web based development platform to aid in the collection of donations and other revenues. As well we are budgeting for an extra pay-out for vacation pay in the amount of \$15,000 to reduce our excess vacation pay owed which currently stands at \$32,000 and has never been allowed for in our financial statements as pointed out by the auditors each year.

Grand Exalted Ruler Expenses

We have budgeted \$54,050 for Grand Exalted Ruler Expenses to cover his travel and other expenses in the coming year.

Lodge Membership Expenses

The membership and marketing committees are forecasting budgeted expenses of \$19,100 for fiscal 2016-17 a decrease of \$26,643 due to the postponement of the leadership training course to Convention 2017.

Committee Expenses

The total budget for committee expenses for fiscal 2016-17 is \$26,991 a decrease of \$2,607 from 2015-16 actuals. All committees are to be applauded for keeping their costs down and for their efforts in helping with the budget process.

<u>Overall</u>

For the fiscal year ending April 30, 2017 we are forecasting a net surplus of \$295. After allowing for a net transfer of \$6,900 to various reserves the net decrease to unrestricted funds will be \$6,605.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Audit/Finance Committee has made the following recommendations to the Grand Executive for the coming year.

- 1. That the Executive Administrator and Finance Committee with assistance from the Grand Executive review the CRA implications of the make-up of the Board of Directors for the Fund for Children now that the Royal Purple are not involved.
- 2. That the vacation pay and sick leave policies be revised by the Executive Administrator with assistance from the Grand Executive and the Finance Committee.

Our sincere thanks to Grand Lodge office staff. They are to be commended for their dedication and efforts to administer their duties for the benefit of all members.





It's hard to believe that another year has passed, and we have had the responsibility, the headaches, the joy and the honour of marketing the Elks of Canada. SOCIAL MEDIA / TECHNOLOGY

We continue to believe to "bring into the Order the next generation of Elks" WE must use social media! ALL social media, and as these forms of media change we will be forced to adapt and change with the times. THANK YOU to Ryan in the National Office that keeps our different social media platforms updated!

This year in cooperation with the Marketing Committee and the National Office we purchased a license for a software suite called Survey Monkey hopefully most of you have seen this software in the form of a survey we have asked you to complete this year, or you may see it in the years ahead. We believe that the data we can get from



this software is immense, and we hope to expand on its use in the years ahead.

CAROLINE'S CART

The success of this venture continues to grow. There are now carts in all four western provinces from Manitoba west to British Columbia, as well as in Ontario. This year we have had discussion about whether this program would be better handled by the Charities Committee, and this discussion is ongoing.

MARKETING LOGO

NATIONAL INFORMATION BROCHURES / HANDOUTS

This year we have continued to work on modernizing our print resources available from the National Office. We have made a French copy of our Invitation to Join, and also took some of the the ideas from last year's convention in Whitehorse when members helped us design posters for Lodges, and these will be available to Lodges very soon for you to use in your local Lodge marketing needs.



NATIONAL MASCOT

We have really worked hard on this item this year, and set ourselves up for a HUGE amount of follow up work. We began this process by creating an online survey using our new Survey Monkey software.



This survey was sent to all members of the National Executive, all the Provincial Presidents, and all the chairpersons of the national committees. REPORT OF THE RITUAL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 2016

Worthy Grand Exalted Ruler, Brother and Sister Elks of Canada:

Last year the Ritual was a point of discussion, but because of the work associated with welcoming the many Royal Purple Elk Lodges into the Elks of Canada, it was determined that any revisions to the Ritual would be suspended for that year. These new Elk members were informed the Ritual they have used in the past, would continue. However they were also informed when they attended a District or Provincial Elks' meeting the structure of the meeting would follow the Elks Ritual. Members were asked to make the members of the Royal Purple Elks Lodges feel welcome and to provide a demonstration of Elks Ritual. (We, at the Executive level have been told there are instances where these new Elks members have attended District meetings and not been made to feel particularly welcome. They were not provided an explanation or demonstration. This will not help us to become one cohesive Order!)

Turning to the words of the ritual itself. Your committee with the very able assistance of our new Executive Director have conducted a study of the ritual in order to identify specific words or passages that should come under scrutiny. There are two areas for consideration:

- 1. Reference to the "Bible", and
- 2. Words in the Legend of Two Elks that need to be reviewed.

First of all, the Bible. In our Strategic Plan, we are trying to focus on a target group of prospective members that may not be of the Christian faith. Therefore we should be looking for a term that captures the words and teachings of all Faiths. We already permit an applicant using their own publication on which to take the oath of membership, so now we have to make sure the rest of the wording fits this intent.

Secondly, in the Legend of the Two Elks, there are references to the "red man" and to his "wigwam fires" In today's culture the Grand Executive believes these references are perceived as out of place. We have instructed our Executive Director to contact Indigenous groups and ask them to verify this belief and to suggest changes.

These two areas of consideration will form the foundation for Ritual discussions by next year's Ritual Committee.

REPORT OF THE GRAND JUDICIARY COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 2016

Worthy Grand Exalted Ruler, Members of the Grand Executive, Brothers and Sisters, Guests:

It has been an honour again serving the Order as Chair of this Committee. On behalf of PGER Duane Romuld, PER Barb Evans, and myself, it was a pleasure serving YOU and the Order. WE are delighted to be here celebrating the 104th Anniversary of the Elks of Canada.

THANK YOU to each and every delegate that is in attendance here. It is through your dedication and service that this great Order continues to be the force it is and we thank you for caring and helping to steer the direction of this Order.

Worthy Grand Exalted Ruler Dom and members of the Elks of Canada, the activities of this Committee are outlined on our activities over the past year.

1) Attendance at the Grand Lodge Convention

Both myself, with the assistance of PGER Duane Romuld and PER Barb Evans, attended Convention and presented the following Resolutions.

- i) A Resolution to refocus the Vision Statement was presented. This was approved unanimously.
- ii) Resolution to remove any reference of the Royal Purple of Canada as being a Subordinate Unit or an Auxiliary of the Elks of Canada. This was approved unanimously.
 - iii) Resolution to remove the Motto as found in 5.2. This was approved unanimously.
 - iv) A Resolution to change the title of "Executive Administrator" to "Executive Director". This was approved unanimously.
- v) Resolution to amend Section 16- Disciplinary Procedures for Lodges under Trusteeship or Supervision.
 - This was approved unanimously.
 - vi) A Resolution presented by the Saskatchewan Elks Association to have Sports Funding in the National Budget.
 - This Resolution was defeated.

The Grand Lodge Constitution, Bylaws and Regulations have been updated and approved.

2) Request for Procedure from an Association:

Advice was sought on the procedure an Association would use to follow the lead of the Grand Executive to replace the Provincial Chaplain, Provincial Esquire and Provincial Inner Guard with the positions of three elected Directors. Advice was provided.

3) Complaint on the Conduct of a President at Conference:

Disciplinary advice was sought on the process of filing a Complaint with the Association in relation to the conduct of a President during Conference. Advice was provided on dealing with the matter person to person, through the Association or filing a Conduct Complaint as outlined in the Grand Lodge Regulations.

4) Review of the Bylaws of an Alberta Lodge for a New Corporation and the Society

A request was received to review and comment on the New Corporation within an Alberta Lodge and the effect on the former Society. A review was made and an opinion was provided.

5) Accessibility Act (Ontario)

Advice was sought from an Ontario Lodge on the effect of the Accessibility Act coming into effect with the specified timelines.

Advice and sources of relevant information were provided.

6) Round Table Meetings

A member in Saskatchewan was seeking guidance on the proper format for a "Round Table" meeting. This had been referred to the Ritual Committee in the past. An opinion was provided.

7) Review and Approval of Lodge Bylaws

An opinion and guidance was sought on the preparation of a new set of Bylaws/ Regulations for an Ontario Lodge under Supervision. An opinion with recommendations was provided.

8) Power of the Trustees in Relation to Sale/ Lease of Lands by a Lodge

Assistance was sought in drafting a letter to a Lawyer acting on behalf of a B.C. Lodge wanting to sign a Lease and bypassing the Trustees appointed. Legal advice was provided and a letter detailing the power of the Grand Lodge Constitution was presented to the Lawyer.

9) Members being Employed by a Lodge for Pay

Advice was sought on the legality of a Lodge hiring a member to perform and bill for work for a Lodge. An opinion was presented.

10) Notice of Appeal - Disciplinary Proceeding

Advice and process were requested by the Grand Executive in relation to an Appeal by an Ontario member on two counts of Misconduct and a subsequent 6 month suspension. Advice and procedure were provided.

11) Advice on Drafting a Resolution for Conference and the Process

Advice was sought from a RPE member in Saskatchewan on the process required and the manner of composition to bring a Resolution forward to the Conference to effect a change. Advice and contact people were provided.

12) ACT Committee Reports

A request was made to complete a Template and provide the Grand Executive with a concise report detailing what has transpired since the last report, any recommendations we may have and the top priorities the Committee has. The Template was completed and a response provided.

13) Complaint of Election Irregularity and possible Collusion by Senior Executive Officers

Advice was sought from the Grand Lodge Office in relation to a complaint from a B. C. Lodge involving Election Irregularity not in compliance with Grand Lodge Regulations with an added allegation of collusion by the Presiding Officers affecting the Election.

Advice has been provided and the matter is currently being reviewed and action taken.

14) Request on Submission of an Uncirculated Resolution

Advice was sought by a member of a Provincial Association how to make changes to the Regulations by Conference time as the time limit for a Resolution for distribution had passed. Advice was provided on an alternate procedure.

Worthy Grand and delegates, as you can see, the Committee was busier this year than normal so THANK YOU to the membership for utilizing us for your needs. We are here to help you and thus make the Order stronger giving everyone a voice in this Order and helping us to educate.

We are undertaking to develop a Policy for guidance to future Grand Executive and Grand Judiciary members in relation to the process to follow on a Disciplinary Appeal. Because Discipline is so rare and Appeals even rarer, the process becomes grey as there is a lack of experience in relation to these matters.

On behalf of myself, PGER Duane Romuld, PER Barb Evans and on behalf of our legal counsel - Brother Reg Sauer, **THANK YOU** for having faith in us and allowing us to continue serving the Order.

We would like to thank Kevan McBeth, Garnet Roth and the other staff of the Grand Lodge for their assistance, dedication and cooperation. **WE** would further thank you Worthy Grand for your leadership and continued dedication to the Order, to the Grand Executive on your leadership and to each and every one of **YOU** delegates for caring for this Order and for being here to support and promote the Order. 2. ABOUT THE CHARITY

THE ELKS & ROYAL PURPLE FUND FOR CHILDREN is the national charity of the Elks of Canada. It operates as a registered charitable organization in accordance with Canada Revenue Agency guidelines.

(a) Purpose

The purpose of the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children is to provide financial assistance for any purpose that is for the good and welfare of a person prior to attaining his/her 19th birthday, provided an application is sponsored by a Lodge, and for charitable programs addressing the needs of children with hearing and speech disorders and other approved charitable programs or services.



(b) Administration

The Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children is administered by the National Charities Committee under the supervision of the Grand Exalted Ruler.

(c) Focus

The Elks have a long and proud history focusing on helping children and supporting programs related to hearing & speech.

(d) Awards

The national charity has received national and international awards recognizing dedicated and significant contributions in the fields of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology.

The ASHA (American Speech-Language Hearing Association) **Distinguished Service Award** in 1987 - the first time this prestigious award was ever given to an organization outside the United States.

SAC (Speech-Language & Audiology Canada) **Presidential Citation** in 2014.



(ii) Scholarships

Elks of Canada Scholarships are funded through their national charity -- The Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children. The scholarships are administered by Speech-Language and Audiology Canada (SAC). (c) Awareness & Advocacy Campaigns (i) May Campaign

To promote awareness of communicative disorders, related materials are made available. A national awareness campaign directed at "May is Hearing & Speech Month" is conducted. Lodges are encouraged to participate by raising awareness, acknowledging the professionals in the fields of hearing and speech and encouraging those who may not know that services and resources are available.



(ii) Promotion of the Butterfly Symbolism



The butterfly is the symbol of the children we help to hear and communicate. This symbolism is very appropriate! The transformation children go through when they learn to hear and communicate parallels the experiences of a butterfly – emerging from a cocoon of silence, ready to spread its wings and encounter the world.

The National Charities Committee continues to invite members to please display a butterfly to show your support of those we help to hear and communicate. Explain/encourage others to do the same making the butterfly our nationally-recognized

symbol of the deaf and hard of hearing. Use the butterfly at your lodge events, too! (Did you know butterflies are deaf??!)

(iii) Christmas Tree Decorating Contest

To promote the butterfly as the symbol of children who learn to hear and communicate, the National Charities Committee sponsored a Christmas Tree Decorating Contest. The criteria specified that the decorations must include butterflies and signage explain the significance.

Many lodges and members found beautiful and creative ways to involve others, spread the message, and produce amazingly-decorated trees. Prizes were awarded and many entries received honourable mention for the trees that greatly enhanced lodges, public places, homes, etc.



(iv) EHDI Programs

Continuing our long and proud history of supporting programs related to hearing and speech, lodges and supporters are directing their efforts towards EARLY HEARING DETECTION & INTERVENTION programs. A



poster is available to show our support of NEWBORN HEARING SCREENING as an essential first step in the strategy for identifying children with hearing loss and promoting access to timely intervention programs.

A letter campaign involving the leaders of the Elks was conducted immediately after the fall election and the newly-appointed Federal Minister of Health learned about our partnerships with the professionals in the fields. We reiterated our premise that it was time for Canada's federal government to take a leadership role to make EHDI programs a standard of care and a reality across Canada. Our position continues to be that it does not matter where in Canada a child is born, all children deserve access to newborn hearing screening and timely intervention services to enable them to live their lives to their greatest potential.

Addition advocacy efforts year have been directed to what is needed in each province. We all have been working together to applaud the provinces that have implemented programs, and we request action in other provinces that are in the process of setting up proper protocols. Lodge members and other supporters were involved in sending 250 letters to the Alberta Minister of Health to applaud the timeline announced while urging a com-

mitment to excellence. Ninety-five signed postcards were sent to the Minister of Health in Manitoba and 116 postcards were delivered to the Minister of Health in Saskatchewan applauding progress and requesting that all aspects of the 1-3-6 Rule (screening by 1 month of age, diagnosis by 3 months of age, enrollment in intervention services by 6 months of age) be incorporated. Responses received from provincial health ministries demonstrate that much work remains to be done.

The Canadian Provincial and Territorial Early Hearing and Intervention Programs "Progress Report" issued by the Canadian Infant Hearing Task Force, as a follow-up to the Report Card issued in 2014, showed that strong programs exist in some provinces and territories but are still inadequate in many parts of Canada. Although there are efforts to develop new and improve existing programs across the country, significant challenges remain in part due to a lack of government commitment and funding. (iv) SAC Consumer Advocacy Award

Nevertheless we are making our voices heard! We continue to advocate for hearing screening for all newborns, timely access to intervention programs, standardized procedures, province-wide strategies, database management and co-ordinated follow up. The National Charities Committee appreciates the co-operation and support of advocacy efforts by our members and supporters. Based on this commitment and demonstrated support, the National Charities Committee nominated the members of the Elks of Canada for the Speech-Language & Audiology Canada Consumer Advocacy Award. This

prestigious award is given to an individual/group that has made an outstanding impact on the professions by actively and significantly advocating on behalf of individuals with communication disorders locally, regionally and/or nationally.

In April, 2016, Speech-Language & Audiology Canada announced that the Elks of Canada were awarded their 2016 Consumer Advocacy Award! The presentation was made by Judy Schmidbauer, Immediate Past Chairperson of the SAC Board of Directors, at their National Conference in Halifax on April 30, 2016. The award was accepted by Grand Exalted Ruler, Dominic Leach, on behalf of the Elks of Canada. Congratulations!

7. HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2015 ANNUAL MEETING AT CONVENTION

(a) Caroline's Carts Presentation

Brother Leonard Shain, and Kelly Sanford, member of the Marketing Committee, gave an overview of the Caroline's Cart Program. A local family was in attendance and demonstrated how the cart will make a shopping trip enjoyable and manageable for a family with an older child with disabilities.





(b) Convention Grant

On behalf of SAC, Wendy expressed gratitude for all that he did to help thousands of children to access the services and programs they need. She presented Mr. Blake with an award with the following engraved message: "Speech-Language and Audiology Canada recognizes Bill Blake for 28 years of advocacy on behalf of Canadian children with hearing, speech & language disorders". Wendy also extended best wishes to Bill for a happy retirement!






(iii) Vending Machine Program

CALL FOR NATIONAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS

rand Lodge Committee members are appointed annually by the Grand Executive. Committee members work hand in hand with the Grand Executive and staff throughout the year and assist in developing policies and recommendations for consideration of the membership. The task of leading the Order is one requiring dedication, commitment, and the ability to vision into the future. We cannot survive on tradition alone. As true Elks, we owe it to our fellow members, the Order, and our communities to make sure the Elks are in a position in the future to promote the ideals of our Order and to fulfil the needs of our communities.

ational Committees generally meet two or three times throughout the year at the Grand Lodge office in Regina. Most meetings are held on Friday and Saturday to allow for more reasonable airfares and for the members to return home on Sunday. All reasonable expenses are covered in accordance with the National Regulations. Between meetings, Committee members are expected to continue their research and will often communicate with each other via telephone, e-mail, telephone conference and/or video conference calls.

SECTION 11 – CONFLICTS OF INTEREST AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT (PGS 57-59)

- 1. RATIONALE: The Grand Executive, members of Grand Lodge Committees, and the Executive Administrator (herein after referred to as the EXECUTIVE GROUP), have a fiduciary obligation to maintain ethical behaviour during the course of their affiliation with the Elks of Canada and are bound to act honestly, in good faith, and at all times in the best interests of the Elks of Canada and its membership. The Executive Group of the Elks of Canada is ultimately responsible for the creation of a culture which will permeate the organization and its membership. A strong ethically grounded Elks of Canada is only possible when it is governed by a strong ethical National Executive body; in turn, the strength of the National Executive body is grounded in the ethical conduct and approach of each of its Grand Executive members, its Grand Lodge Committee members, and its Executive Administrator.
- 1. Standards of Conduct: The standards of conduct for the Executive Group are based on the governing ethical principles of honesty, benevolence, non-malfeasance, justice, and equity. Recognizing the position of trust in which the membership have placed them, the members of the Executive Group must adhere at all times to the governing principles in all their decision making and recommendations pertaining to any business of the Order. The Mission Statement of the Order, the Vision Statement of the Order, and the direction of the members expressed at a National Convention, provide the DIRECTION in which the Executive Group carry out their leadership responsibilities. The Act of Incorporation, and National Bylaws provide the RULES under which the Executive Group shall operate.
- 2. **Conflict of Interest:** A conflict of interest is a situation in which an Executive Group member has, in relation to a matter coming before the Elks of Canada, a private or personal interest, sufficient to influence or appear to influence the objective, and open minded, loyal exercise of his or her function as an Executive Group member.

The circumstance giving rise to a conflict of interest need not be that of the individual Executive Group member but may be the interest of a person having close family ties to the Executive Group member, a friend, business associate, or colleague of the Executive Group member. There are basically two situations giving rise to a conflict of interest. One is that of financial interest, and the other sometimes not so obvious, is the Executive Group member who through a Grand Executive, committee, or staff position, or on account of some other significant involvement, in another corporation or organization has an obligation of loyalty that conflicts, or appears to conflict with his or her required loyalty to the Elks of Canada.

Each Executive Group member is under an obligation to avoid, whenever reasonably possible, a conflict of interest. However, conflicts of interest may nevertheless arise. In such situations the Executive Group member is required to declare the conflict of interest and refrain from voting on the issue in question. He or she is also required by these guidelines to absent himself or herself from the meeting at any time discussions of the matter giving rise to the conflict occurs. In circumstances of conflict of interest, besides declaring a conflict and absenting himself or herself from the meeting and not voting on the issue, an Executive Group member will be expected not to lobby or otherwise participate in the decision making process.

Executive Group members shall not allow their loyalty to the Elks of Canada to be compromised by their relationship to or involvement in another organization or corporation. In this regard, the Elks of Canada structure is composed of Lodges and other Chartered Units collectively known as the Grand Lodge of the Elks of Canada and each Executive Group member is required, in order to satisfy membership requirements, to be a member of a Lodge of the Elks of Canada. The fact an Executive Group member owes a duty of loyalty to his or her home Lodge or other sanctioned Unit of the Order by virtue of his or her membership, that in itself is not considered to be a conflict of interest. It is therefore not a conflict of interest for the Executive Group member to have in mind the interests of his or her Lodge when considering a matter before the Executive Group, provided always that the Executive Group member keeps an open mind, and is left free to exercise and DOES exercise his or her judgement, take a position, or cast a vote, that he or she believes to be in the BEST INTEREST OF THE ELKS OF CANADA.

 Acknowledgement: Each member of the Executive Group shall be required, as a condition of their appointment, to sign the following undertaking:

I have read and understand the Order's Regulations concerning Conflict of Interest and Standards of Conduct. I promise to always act in accordance with them and as well the code of conduct expected of all Elk members as provided for in the National Constitution, Bylaws, and Regulations, and the Rituals of the Order.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Grand Exalted Ruler and Members of The Grand Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of Canada

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Grand Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of Canada (the "Grand Lodge"), which comprise the balance sheet as at April 30, 2016, and the statements of revenues and expenses, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

As outlined in Note 2, the Grand Lodge does not amortize the cost of the building. In this respect, these financial statements are not in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. If amortization expense was recorded on the original cost of the building and on subsequent additions and the costs of such additions were capitalized and not expensed, amortization expense for the year would have increased by \$16,018 (2015 - \$16,018). The deficiency of revenues over expenses for the year would have increased by \$16,018 (2015 - \$16,018) and net assets at year end would have decreased by \$259,238 (2015 - \$243,221).

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Grand Lodge derives revenue from membership fees, donations and fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Grand Lodge and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the year ended April 30, 2016 and April 30, 2015, current assets as at April 30, 2016 and April 30, 2015, and net assets as at May 1 and April 30 for both the 2016 and 2015 fiscal years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended April 30, 2015 was modified accordingly, because of the possible effects of this scope limitation.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraphs, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Grand Lodge as at April 30, 2016, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 2016

1. THE ORGANIZATION

The Grand Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of Canada (the "Organization" or "Grand Lodge") is a national, fraternal and charitable organization, promoting and serving community needs through volunteer efforts of local Lodges. This not-for-profit organization was incorporated in 1913 by a Special Act of Parliament and is not subject to income tax under the Income Tax Act.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Organization's accounting policies and its standards of financial disclosure are in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, except for the Organization's policies for capital assets, as explained in note 2e.

a) Basis of Presentation

These financial statements reflect only those financial activities conducted by the Grand Lodge. These financial statements do not reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of its constituent lodges and its affiliated entities.

b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and use assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimations. The Organization estimates an allowance for doubtful accounts and also estimates the fair value of financial instruments.

c) Fund Accounting

The Constitution and By-laws of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of Canada prescribe that the funds of the Grand Lodge shall include the General Fund, the Reserve Fund and the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children.

The purpose of the General Fund is to carry out the general administration and payment of general expenses of the Grand Lodge. It is to invest cash balances that are not required for the day-to-day operations of the Grand Lodge.

The internally restricted net assets consist of Reserve Funds specifically set aside by the Grand Lodge to finance some part of the Organization.

The Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children (the "Committee") may provide financial assistance for any purpose that is:

- a) for the good and welfare of a person prior to attaining their nineteenth birthday resident in Canada, which has been approved as an appropriate purpose by the Committee, or;
- b) for other charitable programs or services provided for and approved in the annual operating budget.

The accompanying financial statements disclose the financial position and the operations of these funds

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 2016

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

d) Inventory of Supplies

Supplies are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, with cost determined on an average cost basis.

e) Capital Assets

The Grand Lodge's approved accounting policy is to record the office building located at 2629-29th Avenue, Regina, Saskatchewan at its original cost of \$890,000 and to expense all subsequent expenditures on renovations, additions or major repairs as incurred. The original cost of the building is not being amortized. As disclosed in Note 5, management believes the fair value of the building is now significantly greater than its original cost.

f) Personal Assistance Programs

Commitments to provide funding are recognized as an expense of the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children when the National Sub-Assistance Committee approves the funding.

g) Investments

The Organization's investments described in Note 4 are carried at fair values, as reported by Scotia Asset Management, the investment manager.

h) Revenue Recognition

Membership fees are recorded as revenue over the applicable membership period when they can be measured and collectability is assured.

i) Employee Benefits

The Grand Lodge contributes 5% of basic salary into the employee's individual RRSP plans. Under the RRSP plan, the Grand Lodge's obligations are limited to making required contributions. The Grand Lodge also funds an employee life insurance and health insurance plan by covering a portion of the premiums exclusive of premiums for LTD coverage. These contributions and premiums are expensed in the period in which they are made.

j) Financial Instruments

The Grand Lodge initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. The Grand Lodge subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments that are quoted in an active market which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of revenues and expenses.

Transaction costs related to financial instruments measured subsequent to initial recognition at fair value are expensed as incurred.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 2016

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Transaction costs related to other financial instruments are added to the carrying value of the asset or netted against the carrying value of the liability and are then recognized using the effective interest method. Any premium or discount related to an instrument measured at amortized cost is amortized over the expected life using the effective interest method and recognized in net earnings as interest income or expense.

With respect to financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost, the Grand Lodge recognizes in net earnings an impairment loss, if any, when it determines that a significant adverse change has occurred during the period in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows. When the extent of impairment of a previously written-down asset decreases and the decrease can be related to an event occurring after the impairment was recognized, the previously recognized impairment loss shall be reversed in net earnings in the period the reversal occurs.

Foreign Exchange Risk – The Grand Lodge is exposed to foreign exchange risk due to investments in U.S. and International equities. The Grand Lodge does not use derivative instruments to mitigate its exposure to foreign currency risk.

Interest Rate Risk – Interest rate risk refers to the adverse consequences of interest rate changes on the Grand Lodge's cash flows, financial position and income. This risk arises from changes in fair value on the fixed income investments held within the bond funds held by the Grand Lodge.

Other Price Risk – Other price risk associated with investments in shares and pooled funds is the risk that their fair value will fluctuate because of changes in market prices.

Credit Risk – The Grand Lodge's principal financial assets are cash, investments and accounts receivable, which are subject to credit risk. The carrying amounts of financial assets on the statement of financial position represent the Grand Lodge's maximum credit exposure at the statement of financial position date.

The Grand Lodge's credit risk is primarily attributable to its trade receivables. The amounts disclosed in the statement of financial position are net of allowance for doubtful accounts, estimated by the management of the Grand Lodge based on previous experience and its assessment of the current economic environment. The Grand Lodge does not have significant exposure to any individual customer. The credit risk on cash and investments is limited because the counterparties are chartered banks with high credit-ratings assigned by national credit-rating agencies. The Grand Lodge also limits its exposure by ensuring that it has invested in a diversified portfolio and that there is no large exposure to any one issuer.

Liquidity Risk – The Liquidity risk is the risk of being unable to meet cash requirements or to fund obligations as they become due.

The Grand Lodge manages its liquidity risk by constantly monitoring forecasted and actual cash flows and financial liability maturities, and by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash.

Accounts payable are generally repaid within 30 days.

6. SUSPENDED LODGE TRUST ACCOUNT

The Constitution and Bylaws of the Grand Lodge provide that when a subordinate Lodge surrenders its Charter, Grand Lodge assumes its assets in trust. In the event of a Subordinate Lodge being reorganized within five years, all assets held in trust shall be restored to the Subordinate Lodge. If the Subordinate Lodge is not reorganized within five years, all such assets shall be transferred to the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children or directly to a charity in the community in which the Lodge was located, if such a request is made by members of the Lodge at the time of dissolution. There was \$65,394 in trust funds held on April 30, 2016 (2015 – \$50,808).

a) Contingency Reserves:

The General Fund Contingency Reserve has been established to meet one year's operation costs and is administered under the direction of the Audit/Finance Committee. Effective April 30, 2016, no additional funds were required to be transferred to the reserve as per Article 2 Section 5.2.1 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws.

The National Charities Committee has established, upon the recommendation of the Grand Lodge Audit/Finance Committee, a Contingency Reserve for the Elks and Royal Purple Fund for Children which by policy will be adjusted annually to equate to one year's operating expenses. Effective April 30, 2016, no additional funds were required to be transferred to the reserve.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 2016

7. INTERNALLY RESTRICTED FUNDS (Continued)

b) National Sports Reserve:

This reserve will remain in effect to receive future funding from funds accumulated from national sports events and it is proposed that the reserve will be used to fund future sports projects. Effective April 30, 2016, \$3,817 was transferred from the unrestricted funds to the reserve, as per Article 2 Section 5.3.2 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws.

c) Employee Benefit Reserve:

This reserve was established to fund future benefit payments and exceptional costs arising from time to time for current and future employees. The reserve is administered by the Grand Executive in accordance with their policies as determined from time to time. Effective April 30, 2016, \$81,331 was transferred from the reserve to the unrestricted funds to cover costs related to long term service awards and the executive search costs, and \$6,000 was transferred to the unrestricted funds to the reserve as per policy and direction of the Grand Executive.

d) Elks Memorial Building Fund Reserve:

This reserve is comprised of amounts bequeathed, donated or contributed by members of the Elks, Royal Purple, or any other interested parties. The Reserve is administered by the Grand Executive of the Elks of Canada, and shall be used exclusively towards the enhancement of the Elks National Building in accordance with Article 2 Section 5.3.1 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws. Effective April 30, 2016, no additional funds were required to be transferred to the reserve.

e) Facility Contingency Reserve:

This reserve has been established from funds accumulated from net lease revenues and will be utilized for replacement or major repair or renovation of any part of the building or building service equipment. Effective April 30, 2016, \$15,000 was transferred from the unrestricted funds to the reserve, as per policies established and approved by the Grand Executive, as per Article 2 Section 5.1 of the Grand Lodge Bylaws.

f) National Curling Reserve:

This reserve has been established under the direction of the Grand Executive to provide for on-going promotion of National Curling administered by the newly established National Curling Committee under the direction of the National Sports Committee. Effective April 30, 2016, no additional funds were required to be transferred to the reserve, as per policies established and approved by the Grand Executive.

g) Legacy Reserve:

This reserve has been established under the direction of the Grand Executive to provide for on-going promotion of the Elks of Canada. Effective April 30, 2016, \$2,618 was transferred from the reserve to the unrestricted funds, as per policies established and approved by the Grand Executive.

8. CONTRACTUAL SERVICES

Under an agreement with the National Charities Committee, a sum of \$219,000 (2015 - \$214,700) was paid to the Grand Lodge as a fee for service for the provision of support and administration services provided by the Grand Lodge Office. The Grand Lodge Office provides all staff and services to carry out all charitable programs, fund raising and administrative and general support functions of the Elks & Royal Purple Fund for Children as approved by the National Charities Committee. The amount received is credited to the Grand Lodge salaries account thereby reducing the total salaries and benefits paid for the Grand Lodge to \$302,974 (2014 - \$265,354).

The agreement between the Funds has no fixed terms. AND WHEREAS all members are obligated on it for membership or for Office at which times all members assume the sign of fidelity;


